<p>Camden Market</p> <p>One of the biggest markets in the North of London is called Camden Market. Here you can find a lot of special things; the shops have crazy designs and some people dress up in funny clothes. An absolute adventure!</p>	
<p>London Eye</p> <p>The highest observation wheel in Europe with a height of 135 metres. As it was opened to the public in the year 2000, it is also called "Millennium Wheel". Take a ride and enjoy a beautiful view over the City of London!</p>	
<p>Big Ben</p> <p>If people talk about Big Ben, they think about a tower and the clock on it. But actually, only the bell inside is called Big Ben. Two times a day, you can listen to sound of the bell on BBC.</p>	
<p>Tower Bridge</p> <p>This bridge crosses the river Thames close to the Tower of London. That's where the name comes from. The central part of the bridge can be opened, so even high ships can pass. Did you know that about 40'000 cars cross the bridge each day?</p>

Westminster Abbey

The first church at the place where Westminster Abbey stands today was built more than 1300 years ago. The kings and queens of Great Britain get their crown there and usually also marry in there. It is visited by millions of tourists each year.

Shakespeare's Globe

On the south bank of the river Thames you can find this round theatre. It is a reconstruction of Shakespeare's original theatre which burned down in 1613. Today you can still watch Shakespeare most famous plays here.
